Do You Remember?

Historical Vignette

NO. 24

Continuing with the survey of early Main Street, which we began last week, the house below Meyers Garage is remembered as the Freer house. We believe George Fowler, a musician identified with several local bands, lived here about eighteen ninety. Isaac C. Dayton's Millinery store came next. Adjoining this was the Andrew J. Smith Sr. hotel and barber shop the meeting place of many expert and enthusiastic fishermen. Mr. Smith was considered one of the best authorities on angling here at that time. The McCordle Undertaking Parlors was for many years the home of James Eltinge, a contracting builder. Next door was the Walt Church bakery which was later operated as the Sammons and Wood bakery. This is said to be the old Thomas O'Hara hotel of an era beyond the writer's memory. It was originally a one story and attic colonial type building running lengthwise with the street. About 1895 Dr. Harvey C. Keator bought and extensively remodeled this building for office and residential purposes. Below this two other buildings were erected. One of these was the upper Duyn building adjoining the earlier Fritz Duyn home below which was a house then said to have been occupied by the Freers and Ropers. About 1892 Sheriff Thomas Van Tassel remodeled this house and lived there until its purchase by Dr. Patrick Hayden. The Veeder Drug Store was built in the early nineties. The William Coutant house was then occupied by the Coutants. The Lewis C. Bowen Meat Market was at that time one of the busiest and interesting plants on Main street. In the rear were barns, slaughtering and ice houses and refrigeration equipment for the processing of meat which Mr. Bowen often bought in carload lots on the hoof. These drovers of wild steers enroute to Bowen's were one of the picturesque sights of bygone days.

Next to Bowens, if memory serves us, lived Storm Haines, a Civil War veteran and musician whose funeral about eighteen ninety-two, was a large and highly impressive event here; it being conducted with musical accompaniment under military escort followed by a long line of his fellow veterans.

Davis and Hoffman then sold stoves, ranges, tinware, etc., in the Baptist Church and Parsonage. Mr. Gallender was then the pastor and a little later he was succeeded by Mr. Richards. Founded locally over a century ago this congregation once had a flourishing membership and exerted a fine local influence. We regret its passing.

Fairlawn, the beautiful home of Dr. C. V. Hasbrouck, was built some time in the eighties. Below this stood two houses owned by William Campbell. Besides their owner our memory associates the Ten Hagens, the Van Wagnens, and the Canfields with these houses. Next came the Schoonmaker furniture store and undertaking parlor. In subsequent years Joseph McGinn Sr. conducted a grocery in this old building. Ann Keator then lived in the Keator Homestead which has since been torn down. Behind Keators in the

School Lane a new building was erected (1895). This was occupied by Jacob Wood and William Keator. The School principals were all men in those days and in common with schools of the period our local institution has many traditions attesting to the hardships and vicissitudes of early pedagogy. As of eighteen eighty-six a partial list of the school personnel recalls the Bowens, Lees, Woods, Rhodes, Smiths, Stolls, Flemings, Butlers, Brennans, Snyders, O'Reillys, McCarthys, Freers, Hills, Parsons, Macks, Curtins, Fields, Dubois, Malias, Parsons, Lefevers, Bogardus, Keators, Quinns, McCarthy's, McClaffertys, Dugans, Gallaghers, Carrolls, Pinkmans, Slaters, Carters, Hubens, Ten Hagens, Lewis, Rocks, Delanceys, Kenneys, Habens, Craigs, Steelys, Cullens, Fergusons, Terwilligers, Van Wagnens, Durhams, Matrins, McLaughlins, McCreerys, Canfields, Welshs, Andersons, Coutants, Connellys, McCarthys, Wynns, Ropers, Baxters, etc.

Of the early principals were recall Mr. Bennett, Mr. Robinson, Mr. Stryker, and Mr. Ryon. Other teachers were Miss Sweet, Miss Ahern, Miss Rhodes, Miss Sunderland, Miss Treevale, Miss White, Miss Smith and Miss Craig.

Opposite the schoolhouse Morgan Coutant built several houses on the "circus lot". This lot was the scene of many fine circuses and other exhibitions. It served well the function of a village commons. Here many public meetings and celebrations were held. Here were brick Sammons building. The MacNamee family and others lived upstairs. The Haffords lived in the adjoining cottage. Next came the enjoyed many clambakes. Here came the traveling merry-go-rounds, patent medicine shows and tented exhibitions of many types which attracted both old and young to this point on pleasant evenings of vanished summers.

Out on the lower corner of School Lane Lawyer Kenyon had his residence. Next came the Geo. Mattman Hotel, then the Silas Anderson home, then the McClafferty homestead. The Patrick McNickle hotel after successive leasing by Thos. McEvoy and John Daly was remodeled about 1896 for the use of St. Peter's Temperance Cadets which under the guidance of the late Bishop Cusack

and his local curate Father Edward Halloran became a highly constructive moral force among the youth of that generation; some of whom still retain their pledge of temperance. This organization had the best equipped library and gymnasium hereabouts. It gave many amateur entertainments, dances and occasional picnics. It had its own baseball nine and a fine drum corps. It developed some excellent boxers and its library afforded an acquaintance with the classics to the studiously inclined. Who remembers Father Halloran's brilliant Memorial Day speech at the village observance here forty-one years ago?

Of the two remaining houses on the south side of Main street, the first was then occupied by the Roper and Terpening families. The last house was then brand new and was the home of Peter Springer. Beyond, then as now, were the Big Trees. This to the best of our memory completes our picture of the south side of Main street from eighteen eighty-six to nineteen hundred.

Other articles will endeavor to describe the other side of the street as of the same period. We acknowledge with thanks the receipt of corrections, suggestions and helpful information otherwise. These we file and will make adequate use thereof in the order of their relevance to the subject matter immediately at hand.
